From Across the Principal's Desk

Tēnā koutou katoa,

Firstly I would like to say thank you to all of the staff, students and community of Opihi College for your warm welcome. The mihi whakataua late last term, with that rousing performance of the school haka, was very moving. Student enthusiasm made me feel proud that I have been appointed to this role, and definitely made me look forward to beginning at the start of this term.

Anzac Assembly

We began term two with our ANZAC assembly – admittedly two weeks after the 25th April, but the holidays threw things out a bit. Dean Calder very ably piped us in, and Wiremu Te Haate and Teā Prentice both took roles in the assembly by sharing poems. Next year we hope to be in a position to include a ceremony incorporating the inclusion of the names of World War II alumni on our Honours Board.

Curriculum

“My Time” sessions for term two began last week with students having the opportunity to choose from a very diverse range of subjects. The learning opportunities students gain from participating in areas of interest to them make the time well worthwhile. We have students who are interested in media studies and journalism along with those interested in graphic design, developing our 2016 year book. We have students who are interested in pursuing careers and hobbies in BMXing and skateboarding taking the opportunity to further their skills. Some students are working on their ‘animation’ skills, with a view to creating animated story powerpoints for sharing with young children. There are students doing extra work in their study areas and those learning new skills and consolidating old ones in various sporting fields. It is wonderful to see the enthusiasm students are putting into their learning in these areas, and reaffirms my belief that if you capture student interest and engagement, you will see improved outcomes for them.

Junior Sports Tournament

I was fortunate last week to attend Pleasant Point School, along with 30 of our Year 7/8 students for the Geraldine/Pleasant Point Winter Tournament. I was genuinely impressed by the behaviour of our students. The leadership they showed and their

confidence to self-manage their teams, spoke loudly and clearly of the work their teachers here at Opihi College do with them. They also put every effort into the sports they played which showed evidence of their dedication.

Teacher Only Day

We have a Teacher Only Day on **next Monday (16th May)**. Teachers and Support staff will spend this day in a workshop on Restorative Practice. This is the next step for our PB4L (Positive Behaviour for Learning) and once our staff are upskilled, it is intended that Restorative Practice will become a part of our ‘toolbox’ for working with students on behaviour issues.

Early Finish

The third week of term is a busy one. We will also be **finishing school at 12.50 on Friday 20th May** so that staff can watch the “Most Likely to Succeed” educational DVD. You, as our community, will also be invited to watch and engage with this documentary at a later date. And don’t forget the Ball that night too!



Opihi College Uniform – School Regulations 2016



Junior Summer Uniform (Years 7-10)

- blue check skirt or navy pleated skirt
- white split hem, short sleeve, blouse
- white ankle socks
- or
- mid -blue polo shirt
- navy blue walk shorts
- school socks - dark grey with black, blue and white hoop

Senior Summer Uniform (Years 11-13)

- navy blue skirt
- white split hem, short sleeve, blouse
- white ankle socks
- school blazer (optional)
- or
- white short sleeved shirt designed to sit out
- navy blue walk shorts
- school socks - dark grey with black, blue and white hoop
- school blazer (optional)

Junior Winter Uniform (Years 7-10)

- "Blue Watch" tartan kilt
- long-sleeved white blouse
- black stockings or black over the knee socks
- school tie (optional)
- or
- Polo shirt
- long black dress trousers or navy blue walk shorts
- school socks - dark grey with black, blue and white hoop

Senior Winter Uniform (Years 11-13)

- "Blue Watch" tartan kilt
- long-sleeved white blouse
- black stockings or black over the knee socks
- school tie (optional)
- school blazer (optional) *school tie must be worn with the blazer*
- or
- white long sleeved shirt
- long black dress trousers or navy blue walk shorts
- school tie
- school blazer (optional) *school tie must be worn with the blazer*

All Seasons - Junior and Senior

- All students to wear black, leather or leather look, shoes of a plain design with enclosed toes. Shoes must be able to be polished, not suede or canvas. They must be shoes, not boots. They must comply with Health and Safety requirements for protection of the foot in technology and science areas.
- Students are advised to wear a blue sunhat (not baseball cap) in Term 1 and Term 4. Sunhats can be purchased through the school office.
- Plain navy blue or black beanies may be worn with the winter uniform during Term 2 and Term 3.
- Black soft shell jacket with crest; or any plain black jacket of their choice for warmth.
- Dark Royal, V-necked, long sleeved jersey with school crest
- Dark Royal, V-necked, vest with school crest
- A non-hooded plain navy blue polar fleece jacket may be worn.
- PE uniform - Opihi College Rugby/Polo shirt with black shorts (mid-thigh maximum length and no cycle type shorts). A change of socks are to be worn with gym shoes. On cold days a black track suit or a plain coloured sweat shirt in your house colour and track pants may be worn. A white sweatshirt is also acceptable. *(The P.E. Rugby / Polo shirts are available to order and purchase through the school office – cost \$60.00.)*

PERSONAL PRESENTATION – SCHOOL REGULATIONS

These regulations apply to all students. The appearance of the students is expected to reflect credit on the school at all times.

- Hair must be clean, tidy and tied up if longer than shoulder length. No extremes including changing hair to unnatural colours. Boys must be clean-shaven. Hair ties must be in school colours. (Blue, black and white.)
- A Taonga or other item of religious or cultural significance may be worn appropriately. It is to be removed for health and safety reasons as required.
- Students may only wear one **plain** silver or gold stud earring per ear at their own risk. No other jewellery should be visible. Facial piercing, nose studs, tongue piercing and visible tattoos are not permitted.
- For students in Years 7 – 13 the school uniform is to be worn correctly and neatly. Make-up and coloured nail polish are not to be worn with school uniform.

PLEASE NOTE: Winter Uniform is optional from the beginning of Term 2 but is compulsory after Queen's Birthday weekend. **Summer Uniform** is optional from September 1st but is compulsory after Labour Weekend.


