OPIHI STUDENTS EXTEND THEIR JAPANESE STUDIES AT UC

On Thursday 11 June, senior Japanese students Abigail Blay, Ellen Crosse, Shanique Guile, Will Johnson, Tegan Robertson, Tea Prentice, Wiremu Te Haate, Jessie Evans, Aidan Howey and Zac Ross travelled to Christchurch to participate in the Christchurch Secondary Schools' NCEA Japanese Workshop at the University of Canterbury. The students had the opportunity to experience a variety of workshops geared to help prepare them for their NCEA Achievement Standards. 270 students from 15 high schools worked together with 50 high school teachers, university instructors and university students. It is the largest group of secondary and tertiary instructors in New Zealand co-operating together to extend our high school learners. Opihi College Students worked in small groups

From Across the Principal's Desk

Kia ora tatou

During the last week we have issued to all students a survey relating to the issue of the

Transport Entitlement Zone. It is important that we have as many responses as possible back to Opihi College. The deadline was Friday 26 June. We will still accept responses on Monday 29 June after which the results will be forwarded to the Ministry of Education. We would like a response to the survey from each individual. Please take the time to complete the survey as this could have an impact upon the staffing and resources for Opihi College in the future. Innovative Learning environments

During the last two weeks a group of teachers have taken over the Library and trialled working in a modern learning environment or what is now referred to as an Innovative Learning Environment (ILE). The feedback from students was great to read and provides valuable information about what we will need to consider when we have our new facilities. The consensus was that students enjoyed the environment, many said they had improved concentration and enjoyed working alongside other students and their teachers.

Contextualised learning

Following on from the trial of the ILE the Year 9 English and Social Studies programme is going to trial a contextualised learning programme in Term 3. This means that students will have a change of focus and a more seamless approach to their learning for these two curriculum areas. The teachers concerned have already spent a considerable amount of time preparing for this trial and we look forward to the feedback at the conclusion of the trial.

Morning PD sessions

Thank you to the parents, caregivers and students who cooperated to allow the teaching staff to meet for a second morning professional development session. We are finding that the time has been very productive and have allowed staff the opportunity to share ideas for the development of the curriculum for senior students and how the school timetable may look in the future.

Careers Option Evening—7pm Tuesday 18th August

The Careers Option Evening is usually an event for Year 10, 11 and 12 students and their parents to review what is available for courses in the following school year. This year we will have two visitors from the Ministry of Education who will be sharing some of the opportunities available to students with the Vocational Pathways qualifications which are now available for our students. It would be beneficial for parents of <u>all</u> students to attend this informative meeting if only to hear the opportunities that are available.

New Buildings

Each of the above topics are all working towards preparing for our new buildings. Whilst we review our curriculum to provide the best possible opportunities and highest quality of education for our students we are also very much aware of the prospect of what our new classrooms could look like in the future. As I explained to students earlier this week, I do not know when we will have our new classrooms but I do expect that we will be preparing for the demolition of some buildings within the next twelve months and shortly afterwards we will see the first of the new classrooms under construction. I also know that the Ministry of education is prepared to spend millions of dollars on the Opihi College site and that we can anticipate to have some of the best education facilities in the South Island.

Invoices

Invoices were sent out to parents and caregivers earlier this term. This was slightly later than usual but it would be appreciated if families could please pay these as soon as possible. We do encourage families to set up automatic payments in order to spread the cost over the school year. Forms to start this process are available from the school office. Thank you to those families who have already paid or are in the process of drip feeding their payments to the school. The money generated goes directly to cover the cost of materials and resources for your child. Please note that in some cases it may be necessary for the school to retain some student work until payments are received.

Thank you to all the Y8 and Y11 students and parents who completed the survey and have returned it to the school. All surveys received by Friday 26 June will go in the draw for a family movie pass. This will be drawn at our end of term assembly.

On Friday 3 July we will be holding our usual end of term assembly starting at 2:15pm. We will be celebrating the successes of our students in both academic, sporting and cultural activities. We encourage parents and caregivers to attend this event which will be a great round up for the end of term.

Currently the Board of Trustees are reviewing the school uniform for all students at Opihi College. The Board is anxious to develop a uniform which is distinctive, reflects the image of Opihi College, is durable and hard wearing and is cost effective for families to purchase. We encourage all parents to make sure that they provide feedback at the appropriate consultation. No decision has been made as to what the uniform will be in 2016 or beyond. Once a new uniform is decided this will be communicated to all parents and there will be a period of time when there will be a transition from the current to the new design.



Based on the individual student's personality profile, they then get to shadow an employee based at one of the companies for a day. So far students have been inspired by employees like surveyors, truck drivers, physiotherapists, laboratory technicians and many other different occupations. This programme provides the students with the opportunity to experience a job that they may not previously have considered and find out what you need to do to get into this particular career.

Vocational Pathways

ERO has recently released a document to schools describing the best practice for transitioning learners from education to employment when they are ready.

In the document ERO describes the outcome of a survey around the skills 21st century employers in NZ wish their new employees to display. Their findings identified the following themes:

Literacy, oral communication and numeracy skills
A positive attitude to learning, self development and constructive criticism
Reliability, honesty and resilience
Critical thinking, problem solving
Able to plan and organize, be a team player
Able to manage time and take initiative
Confident with modern technologies

So what is happening at Opihi College to support the development of these skills?

Teachers use assessment information and talk with students. Your child has a mentor who is able to share this information, alongside student goals and achievements at conferencing meetings.

There is a whole school focus on the development of Literacy and Numeracy through our Charter.

Staff are undertaking training on teaching strategies for Critical Thinking Skills and Reflective Practice.

Our CARE values honour and reward key skills and competencies such as team-work, honesty, reliability and good planning.

Learners engage in a school Careers education programme with opportunities such as Work Inspiration, Gateway, Rangatahi Futures and partnerships with Aoraki Polytechnic.

Our BYOD programme and investment in Wi-Fi and ultra-fast broadband encourages technological engagement. Students should endeavor to bring a suitable device to school to make the most of their learning opportunities.

Learners are encouraged to self monitor their achievement using the portal, Kamar app and NZQA website.

Opihi College supports students looking towards Excellence and Merit endorsements as well as Vocational Pathways Awards.

If you would like to learn more about Vocational Pathways and how they can assist your child to make a successful transition to the workplace (whether that is directly from school, or after their Tertiary course including University), **please come along to our Careers and Options Evening at 7pm on Tuesday 18**th **August**. We will have the benefit of guest speakers from the Ministry of Education – Rawiri Gibson and John Hogue.

GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAMME

Hayley McLean has had the opportunity to take part in the New Zealand Marine Studies Centre Gifted and Talented Residential Programme down in Dunedin. Hayley, who is the only student from the Timaru/Temuka area, has joined students from schools from around the South Island who have



to be mentored through a research project by a Marine science Masters or PhD research student. Hayley has participated in two residential trips to Dunedin with a third trip coming up in July. The programme involves investigating and collaborating with peers and professional academics and also involve:

- Exploration and extension of human senses in discovering the marine world
- Enquiry into marine animal senses and their responses
- Working with teams, collaboration and co-operation, planning, time management and problem solving
- Developing awareness of cognition, meta-cognition and science communication
- Science investigation development, design and practical data gathering in the field and in the laboratory
- Qualitative and quantitative information and processing the information
- Preparing and presenting to an audience the process, analysis and the synthesis of the project
- Engaging in the team and peer review and critique as part of the nature of science
- Creative challenges applying science to novel situations
- Engaging and sharing as young scientists in a knowledge building community.

Hayley was interested in marine studies before this opportunity arose and was considering this field as a potential career. She has thoroughly enjoyed her time attending this programme and has enriched her knowledge of marine studies. I am sure she will have much to share with the students at Opihi College as well as enthuse the year 9 students for any similar opportunities in 2016.


