
This highly entertaining competition was held at the end of Term 2. Each house performed a haka, the school waiata and a selection of New Zealand music.

Dear Parents / Caregivers,

Kia ora tatou

It is impossible for me to start this newsletter without first acknowledging the fact that I will be departing at the end of this school year to take up the position of Principal at South Otago High School in Balclutha. I was unable to make the announcement public until part way through the first week as I had agreed to keep the matter confidential until Wednesday morning.

On Friday, a student asked me when had I decided to leave Opihi College. The decision to apply for the position was based upon several factors. However, having made the decision to move on I do feel that this is very good timing for both myself, my family and the school.

During the last four years there has been significant change at Opihi College. The future of the school is secure, the performance of students both academically and socially is very high and the school is about to embark on further transformational changes which will see it become one of the best purpose built secondary schools in South Canterbury with over \$4m being spent on the property development.

The Board of Trustees are currently preparing to advertise for a new Principal and have advice from the New Zealand School Trustees Association and the same advisor who assisted in my recruitment four years ago. I am confident that they will find an excellent Principal. I have offered my support right up to the point where the new Principal starts.

In the short term Kate Staniford will be Acting Principal for Term 1 of 2016. Kate will lead the school well and be supported by Bernie Rose. Although I am departing I will be continuing to work for the best interests of the students and this community right up until my last day. I will continue to have a strong interest in the school even after I have left.

#### **Head Students**

On Monday the head student candidates spoke to the students and staff about why they should be appointed to this important role in 2016. The standard of the presentations was extremely high and it will be a real challenge for staff and students to make a decision. I look forward to announcing the head students for 2016 at the Awards night on Friday 4 December.

#### **NCEA Exams**

The fourth term does mean the culmination of NCEA studies. For many students this will include external assessments. These are due to start on Monday 9 November with NCEA L1 Maths. For all senior students, staff will be available to assist with last minute tuition and support right up until the end of the school year. However, it is important that students book a time in to meet with their teachers as this is a busy time with camps and trips out of school.

#### **Community Workday**

This year we are holding our first ever Community Workday. This is an opportunity for students to give something back to the community. The school is looking for work for Year 7 to 10. Ideally we would like community organisations who could do with an extra pair of hands for a day or for people who may struggle with some tasks that younger people could take on for the day.

#### **Awards Night**

On Friday 4 December we will be holding our annual Awards Night celebration of student success in academic and top sporting activities. During the day, students will attend school in the morning and then be released to go home in the afternoon. This free afternoon is in lieu of attending in the evening. All students are expected to attend the awards night unless the school receives a letter of explanation from the parent /caregiver prior to the event. Students who do not attend will be regarded as truant and will be expected to make up the time missed.

#### Have a go Sailing

In the first week of the summer holiday, students from Year 7 to 9 have the opportunity to try sailing for a day. Letters have been distributed to interested students. This is a great opportunity to try a new sport at a very cheap price. I encourage students to get involved and 'Have a Go!'

#### **Finally**

I look forward to a busy and rewarding term. I expect students to be aiming to fulfil their potential this term. For seniors, your reward will be the results which you gain in January.

#### All Seasons - Junior and Senior

- All students to wear black, leather or leather look, shoes of a plain design with enclosed toes. Shoes must be able to be polished, not suede or canvas. They must be shoes, not boots. They must comply with Health and Safety requirements for protection of the foot in technology and science areas.
- Students are advised to wear a blue sunhat (not baseball cap) in Term 1 and Term 4. Sunhats
  can be purchased through the school office.
- Plain navy blue or black beanies may be worn with the winter uniform during Term 2 and Term 3.
- Black soft shell jacket with crest<sup>4</sup>; or any plain black jacket of their choice for warmth.
- Blue, V-necked, long sleeved jersey with school crest<sup>2</sup>
- Blue, V-necked, vest with school crest<sup>4</sup>
- A non-hooded plain navy blue polar fleece jacket may be worn.
- PE uniform Opihi College Rugby/Polo shirt with black shorts (mid-thigh maximum length and no cycle type shorts). A change of socks are to be worn with gym shoes. On cold days a black track suit or a plain coloured sweat shirt in your house colour and track pants may be worn. A white sweatshirt is also acceptable. (The P.E. Rugby / Polo shirts are available to order and purchase through the school office cost \$60.00.)

#### PERSONAL PRESENTATION - SCHOOL REGULATIONS

These regulations apply to all students. The appearance of the students is expected to reflect credit on the school at all times.

- Hair must be clean, tidy and tied up if longer than shoulder length. No extremes including changing hair to unnatural colours. Boys must be clean-shaven. Hair ties must be in school colours. (Blue, black and white.)
- A Taonga may be worn appropriately. It is to be removed for physical education and sport as required.
- Students may only wear one <u>plain</u> silver or gold stud earring per ear at their own risk. No
  other jewellery should be visible. Facial piercing, nose studs, tongue piercing and visible
  tattoos are not permitted.
- For students in Years 7 13 the school uniform is to be worn correctly and neatly. Make-up and coloured nail polish are not to be worn with school uniform.

**PLEASE NOTE: Winter Uniform** is optional from the beginning of Term 2 but is compulsory after Queen's Birthday weekend. **Summer Uniform** is optional from September 1<sup>st</sup> but is compulsory after Labour Weekend.

#### AGRIBUSINESS COURSES AND TEENAG CHALLENGE

One such course is the Agribusiness Course that students attend at the Agribusiness Training Centre in Washdyke. Students learn a range of agricultural skills, from animal handling, to learning how to ride a quad bike, to fencing. Whilst these courses are practical in nature all of them are credit based and the credits go towards Level 2 NCEA and a Vocational Pathways Award in Primary Industries.

Going to school every
day is the single most

child's education.

day—missing school puts
them behind.

#### Why its important

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day. Students develop good habits by going to school every day -habits that are necessary to succeed after school, whether in the workplace or in further study. Missing school can have a big impact on students academically and socially. It can affect their test results, including NCEA, and, just as importantly, it can affect their relationships with other students, and lead to social isolation. There is no safe number of days for missing school -each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes. Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.

## Getting in early

It's never too late to improve attendance –going to school more often can lead to better outcomes. Even at Year 9, where attendance rates are lowest, going to school more often can make a big difference. Every day counts. Schools are there to help –if you're having attendance issues with your child, speak to your school about ways to address those issues.

#### What we can do

The main reasons for absence are: **Sickness** - There are always times when students need to miss school. Such as when they're ill. It's vital that they're only away on the days they are genuinely sick, and setting good sleep patterns, eating well and exercising regularly can make a big difference.

"Day Off" - Think twice before letting your child have a "day off" as they could fall behind their classmates. Every day counts.

Truancy—When students choose not to go to school without parent's permission. There can be many reasons for truancy, the best way to address this is for schools and parents to work together.

While all absences are bad for academic performance, unexcused absences are a much stronger indicator of lower reading and maths achievement. If for any reason your child must miss school, there are things you can do with your school to ensure they don't fall behind:

- Speak with your classroom teacher and find out what work your child needs to do to keep up.
- Develop an absence learning plan with your teacher and ensure your child completes the plan.

Remember, every day counts. If your child must miss school, speak with your classroom teacher as early as possible. Openly communicating with your child's school about all absences is a good way to prevent attendance issues being escalated to a School Attendance Officer. If you're having attendance issues with your child, please let your dean, principal or other relevant staff member know so you can work together to get your child to school every day.

A missed school day is a lost opportunity for students to learn. There is a strong correlation between student absence and student achievement. I am noticina a concernina trend of parents taking their kids out of school for four day weekends and extra holidays. It is always stressful for the student to come back and have to catch up. Please schedule dental, physio and orthodontic appointments for after school where possible. Too many students are taking the whole day off for these type of appointments. Sometimes we have to practice 'Tough Love' as a parent, but in doing this you are developing a strong sense of responsibility and self discipline which will aid them immensely when adults.

## THE BEGINNING OF RUGBY IN IRELAND

Dublin University was the first organised rugby football club in Ireland, having been founded in 1854. The club was organised by students who had learnt the game while at English public schools. During the third quarter of the nineteenth century, and following the adoption of a set of official rules in 1868, rugby football began to spread quickly thoughout Ireland, resulting in the formation of several other clubs which are still in existence, including NIFC (1868); Wanderers (1869); Queen's University (1869); Lansdowne (1873); Dungannon (1873): Co. Carlow (1873); UCC (1874); and Ballinasloe (1875) which amalgamated with Athlone to form Buccaneers.

The first Ireland rugby team played England on 19 February 1875 and lost by 2 goals and a try, to nil.

In 1874, the Irish Football Union (reconstituted as the Irish Rugby Football Union after unification with the North of Ireland Union) was formed. Ireland lost their first test match against England 7-0 at the Oval on 15 February 1875. Both teams fielded 20 players in this match, as was customary in the early years of rugby union; it was not until 1877 that the number of players was reduced from 20 to 15. Ireland's first home game was also against England in the same year held at the Leinster Cricket Club in Rathmines, as Lansdowne Road was deemed unsuitable. The first match at Lansdowne Road was held on 11 March 1878, with England beating Ireland by 2 goals and a 1 try, to nil. It was not until 1881 that Ireland first won a test, beating Scotland at Ormea.





# Timaru Metro


During the July school holidays, Year 11-13 students were given the opportunity to race around the city, taking selfies along the way, to be in to win various
