From Across the Principal's Desk

Dear Parents/Caregivers Kia Ora Tatou

Welcome back to school and to Term 3. I hope all of our

families enjoyed the school holidays and that you were all able to take some time to spend with your whanau during the two weeks.

As this term gets underway staff have been considering the courses which will be made available for our students in 2017 and how these will link to employment, further training opportunities and tertiary study. As a result of these consultations we are expecting to expand the opportunities available to students.

It is at this time of year that we, along with all schools in New Zealand, have also been carrying out our predictions for the school roll in 2017. We do expect a degree of growth in our roll which in turn translates to enhanced staffing and funding for the school. This predicted roll growth is a reflection of the positive attitude our community has towards the school and our students' achievements, which encourages others to choose Opihi College as the educator of their children. We are a small secondary school, and we like our size. For that reason we never want to grow too big, but there is certainly room for some growth while still maintaining our special dynamic and culture.

Careers options

Year 10 students will be visiting Year 11 option classes in Week four of this term (week beginning 15th August) to get an idea of what each option area is like at senior level. We are trialling this method this year as teachers have been concerned in the past that students have not always chosen courses for the right reasons or given consideration to all their possible career pathways. The options visits will be followed up with parent/student/teacher conferences in Week 7 of term (5th and 6th September).

learning developing in the future and how we would like that to look at Opihi College. This is the beginning of the consultation process for the new buildings that we will be getting. 
This great night gave students many things to learn, also it let people enjoy themselves, including me.


