# From Across the Principal's Desk

The first news of the month

is: I was severely embarrassed to find, after reports had been sent, that there was an error in the message from me. The comment clearly should have read, "We look forward to continuing our relationship with you in 2017." I will definitely have to do a better job in future at proofreading!

This is our last newsletter for 2016, and before I get into the 'end of year' stuff, I want to mention a couple of activities that our juniors have been involved in.

### Activities

On the 25th and 26th of November a group of our Year 7 and 8 students attended a music workshop at Bluestone School. By all accounts it was a great success, with students forming a band on the day, practicing at lunch time, and performing in the afternoon. Well done to our students who attended and made the most of the opportunity! Thank you to our music teacher, Mr Fleming, for arranging this experience for our group.

As I'm sure you are aware, we've just had our Year 7 students out on camp at Raincliff. I deliberately made the time each day to go out there to see how they were doing. Having camp only 35km away is a definite advantage! My thanks go to all of the teachers and senior students without whom camp wouldn't run. Special thanks to the two year 10 girls, Geneva and Megan, who stepped in at the last minute to help out.

The students who have been involved in the camp and/or the music workshop can definitely say that they have 'participated'. Participation is one of the elements of the Key Competencies that are at the core of our New Zealand Curriculum.

### Changes for 2017

In Mike Wright's last newsletter of 2015 he said, "Ahead lie many exciting opportunities and a few challenges (for Opihi College). There will continue to be significant change and development which will only strengthen the college." He is right. We faced new opportunities and certainly some challenges heading into 2016. Change has continued, and will continue to. This year we began the year with a radical timetable change. It took a while for students (and staff) to become comfortable with that change, but our tracking of student data indicates that the changes have had an overall positive impact on student outcomes. Feedback and analysis of data have meant we are making some minor tweaks to those changes for 2017 but nothing that people will be uncomfortable with – the key changes will be shortening morning break a little, lengthening lunch break, and having no whanau class on Wednesdays.

One of the many areas we have been looking at is programme delivery and how we might best develop our programmes for our junior students. Year 7 and 8 Technology will be moving to a 2 year cycle. Because we offer our juniors such a broad range of curriculum areas, the delivery has seemed a bit piecemeal and scattered. By changing to the two year cycle we can give students more time in each subject area to consolidate their knowledge, so they are gaining in-depth knowledge rather than a short 'taster'.

With our new buildings still at the forefront of our vision (even though the process is taking far longer than we would like!), we have also been considering how we will move towards integrating learning levels and subject areas. We are currently doing this effectively with our Year 7 and 8 integrated classes, but acknowledge that we have a long way to go in other areas. We don't want to start by 'ripping the current structures apart', but do need to begin on this journey.

To support this in 2017, we are going to move further towards integration by having four combined Year 9/10 classes. Until now, most of our students have been in multi-level classes throughout their schooling and it has only been in Year 9 that they have been separated out. In 2016 we have had a group of teachers researching schools with successful Year 9/10 hubs, and it is clear that those schools who have introduced them are showing improved learning outcomes for their students. This will also mean that we are able to provide a better gender spread in our classes (with 2016's Year 9 girls having been very much in the minority). Students will still move into their separate Year 9 and Year 10 levels for most optional subjects.

I am sure these changes for 2017 will open up exciting learning opportunities for our students. The only thing that might be better would be adding an extra couple of hours to our school day (to fit more learning in) – but until the Ministry comes up with funding for that it's not within our scope!

### **Awards Ceremony**

As I have reminded you in our past few newsletters, the evening of December 7<sup>th</sup> is our Awards Ceremony. This is when we will celebrate the 2016 achievements of our students. I encourage you all to come along and help us acknowledge their effort, their hard work and their participation.

### **READING PLUS**

We have come to the end of the first full year running Reading Plus at Opihi College. Students have worked hard and been very successful. The programme covers reading speed (important for fluency and task completion), reading comprehension and vocabulary. We have seen gains across all these areas as students work towards the end of this first year.

Fluent reading speed is 250 words per minute (wpm), talking speed is 120 wpm. Many students read well but slowly. We have seen significant progress towards fluency throughout the year. The increase in wpm ranges from 5-124 which is an out standing result. Three quarters of the students have moved up between 1 - 3 years in their reading comprehension with the biggest gains in our Year 9 boys.

All students have completed the final assessment in Reading Plus for the year and had a conference to discuss their successes, tricky bits and goals for next year. Higher gains in comprehension, speed and vocab usually match student participation. Students with lower progress generally acknowledged that they could have put some more time into it. With these great results the programme will continue next year and is available to all of our students (\$40/yr). ## **Opihi College Uniform – School Regulations**

### Junior Summer Uniform (Years 7-10)

- blue check skirt (being phased out) or inverted pleat skirt navy (SchoolTex order number 36278)
- white split hem, short sleeve, blouse (SchoolTex order number 86983)
- white ankle socks or
- mid -blue polo shirt (New stock arriving November which will have our school crest on them.)
- navy blue walk shorts
- school socks dark grey with black, blue and white hoop

### Senior Summer Uniform (Years 11-13)

- navy blue skirt
- white split hem, short sleeve, blouse
- white ankle socks
- school blazer (optional) or
- white short sleeved shirt designed to sit out
- navy blue walk shorts
- school socks dark grey with black, blue and white hoop
- school blazer (optional)

### Junior Winter Uniform (Years 7-10)

- "Blue Watch" tartan kilt
- long-sleeved white blouse
- black stockings or black over the knee socks

### Senior Winter Uniform (Years 11-13)

- long black dress trousers or navy blue walk shorts

### All Seasons - Junior and Senior

- All students to wear black, <u>leather or leather look</u>, shoes of a plain design with enclosed toes. Shoes must be able to be polished, not suede or canvas. They must be shoes, not boots. They must comply with Health and Safety requirements for protection of the foot in technology and science areas.
- Students are advised to wear a blue sunhat (not baseball cap) in Term 1 and Term 4. Sunhats can be purchased through the school office.
- Plain navy blue or black beanies may be worn with the winter uniform during Term 2 and Term 3.
- Black soft shell jacket with crest; or any plain black jacket of their choice for warmth.
- Dark Royal, V-necked, long sleeved jersey with school crest
- Dark Royal, V-necked, vest with school crest
- A non-hooded plain navy blue polar fleece jacket may be worn.
- PE uniform Opihi College Rugby/Polo shirt with black shorts (mid-thigh maximum length and no cycle type shorts). A change of socks are to be worn with gym shoes. On cold days a black track suit or a plain coloured sweat shirt in your house colour and track pants may be worn. A white sweatshirt is also acceptable. (*The P.E. Rugby / Polo shirts are available to order and purchase through the school office cost \$60.00.*)





### PERSONAL PRESENTATION - SCHOOL REGULATIONS

These regulations apply to all students. The appearance of the students is expected to reflect credit on the school at all times.

- Hair must be clean, tidy and tied up if longer than shoulder length. No extremes including changing hair to unnatural colours. Boys must be clean-shaven. Hair ties must be in school colours. (Blue, black and white.)
- A Taonga or other item of religious or cultural significance may be worn appropriately. It is to be removed for health and saftey reasons as required.
- Students may only wear one **plain** silver or gold stud earring per ear at their own risk. No other jewellery should be visible. Facial piercing, nose studs, tongue piercing and visible tattoos are not permitted.
- For students in Years 7 13 the school uniform is to be worn correctly and neatly. Make-up and coloured nail polish are not to be worn with school uniform.

**PLEASE NOTE: Winter Uniform** is optional from the beginning of Term 2 but is compulsory after Queen's Birthday weekend. **Summer Uniform** is optional from September 1<sup>st</sup> but is compulsory after Labour Weekend.
