Do you want to learn a little about another country or another language? Why not host a student from Japan and give it a try! We're looking for host families to provide homestays for a group of Japanese boys and girls aged 14-17 from 26 July to 16 August at the beginning of Term Three. They don't need a special room of their own, just a bed to sleep in and a little space for their luggage. You don't have to go out of your way to do anything special with them; simply welcome them into your home and include them as part of your family. Your student would attend school from Monday to Friday and then be away on Saturday or Sunday for a day-trip excursion. We realise that there will be some extra expenses involved in hosting your student, so



will provide each family with \$375 to offset those costs a little.

Why we organise this hosting programme:

- It's a significant fundraiser for the school and helps our students participate in the Japanese Language Trip to Japan.
- Our Opihi College students and family members are exposed to a new language and culture. They
 will try new foods, play new games, and learn about music, art, and crafts.
- Our Japanese language classes at all levels 7-13 get an infusion of real language and culture learning.
- We learn more about the world around us firsthand.

From Across the Principal's Desk

Dear Parents/Caregivers

Tēnā koutou katoa

Welcome back to Term 2. I hope that you all managed to have a break, although I appreciate that the weather didn't make it easy for everyone to get outside as much as you might have liked. It's always a little frustrating when the new term starts with better weather than we had over the holidays!

I note that the first day of this term marked the completion of my first year as Principal at Opihi College. I have definitely enjoyed this first year, and am looking forward to future years (I'll stop ticking them off from here on in). I don't think Principals ever manage to achieve all the things they set out to in any given period of time; however, I'm satisfied that I've met most of my goals for the first year, which were mostly around getting to know staff, students and the "Opihi Culture". I do thank you for the way you have all welcomed me, and allowed me to feel part of your community.

Assemblies

We began this term with our ANZAC Assembly. The Head students, our guests and I were led into the hall by Brooke Thomas on the bagpipes and Ashley Brown on the drum. My thanks to them both for their participation. It was a great opportunity to showcase the talents of these two young ladies. Our Head Students presented the same readings that they offered at the Dawn Service on 25th April. SCHOOL ACCOUNTS

Near the end of Term One we sent out school accounts. We have had a few queries about the amount of some of the items charged. We do our very best to keep subject costs as low as possible and compare very favourably against other schools in South Canterbury. We also understand that even minimal charges are a struggle for some families. We encourage families in this situation to contact us as we don't want to see students miss out on great opportunities. All matters regarding accounts are kept strictly confidential.

A lot of our families pay their account by regular automatic payments. Some as little as \$5 per week. This is a very easy and effective method. Some find they are in credit by the end of the year, which can be refunded or carried over to the next year. Our bank account can be found on the bottom of our invoices.

Sports and extra-curricular activities are of course optional extras for students but usually come with a cost. Because we have to pay up front for these things to happen, it is a requirement of our school that costs for these are paid before they take place. If you have a regular AP then this is negotiable. If payment is not received then your child will not be able to participate.

PB4L at Opihi College

As you will be aware, here at Opihi College we use an initiative call 'PB4L'. You may have heard your child talk about our CARE values, or be excited to receive a CARE card or a badge, or you may know about other aspects of this system. Periodically, we will use the newsletters to further explain how PB4L works to enhance learning for your child.

So what is PB4L?

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L) is a Ministry initiative which supports New Zealand schools, early childhood education (ECE) settings, and whanau to promote positive behaviour and create inclusive learning environments that foster well-being and achievement for every child and student.

BACKGROUND

Positive Behaviour for Learning is built on the principles that positive behaviour can be learnt and that environments can be changed to support effective teaching and learning for every child and student. It also reflects the belief that schools and early childhood education settings play a major role in fostering well-being and creating safe, healthy communities.

HOW DOES PB4L SUPPORT INCLUSION?

The New Zealand Curriculum requires that teaching and learning recognises, supports, and builds on **all** students' identities, languages, cultures, and abilities.

PB4L helps to develop inclusive learning environments that enable all children and students:

- to participate
- to be engaged
- to achieve
- to belong.

Well-being, learning, and behaviour are interlinked. A respectful, inclusive learning environment enables children and students to express their needs and feelings in positive ways that do not set up barriers to learning or achievement.

The New Zealand Curriculum promotes the development of social and emotional competencies. The key competencies, including relating to others, managing self, and participating and contributing, are the "key to learning in every learning area".

PB4L helps to create a learning environment where every child or student can experience success by developing and using these key competencies.



PRE LOVED UNIFORM



<u>Free Dental Care for Children - including special information regarding Year 8 students</u>

One of our Community Dental Service preventive mobiles will be visiting your school soon.

- We will be aiming to see that all school age children enrolled with the Community Dental Service have their dental check-up in the dental mobile while it is there
- Year 8 students: all year 8 students enrolled with the Community Dental Service are transferred
 from the Community Dental Service to a FREE private dentist from year 9 until their 18th birthday.
 To help with this transition please ensure you have informed your child of their family dentist (not
 orthodontist). This will enable us to transfer your child onto the correct dentist for year 9 onwards.
 More information will be sent home after their year 8 check-up.
- To do this we will be asking the school to provide your child's name, address and your contact information.
- The dental therapist will not only be checking the children's teeth but will also Xray, clean, and apply protective treatments fluoride and or Fissure sealants (coating put on teeth to prevent decay) if required
- If your child requires further dental care such as fillings they will bring home a 'Care Plan' which will explain what dental care and appointment times are required
- When you receive the 'Care Plan' please contact our Call Centre as soon as possible as you will
 need to arrange a time to bring your child to one of our Community Clinics for this dental care
- Please let us know ASAP if you do not wish your child to have any of this care, you can talk to the staff in the mobile or phone/email our Call Centre
- If you wish to be present at your child's check up this will need to take place at our community clinic so please phone/email our Call Centre to make an appointment
- Please contact our Call Centre if you want further information on the Community Dental Service, to enrol your child or if you have any specific questions about your child's dental care (a dental therapist will call you back)








All Seasons - Junior and Senior

- All students to wear black, <u>leather or leather look</u>, shoes of a plain design with enclosed toes. Shoes must be
 able to be polished, not suede or canvas. They must be shoes, not boots. They must comply with Health
 and Safety requirements for protection of the foot in technology and science areas.
- Students are advised to wear a blue sunhat (not baseball cap) in Term 1 and Term 4. Sunhats can be purchased through the school office.
- Plain navy blue or black beanies may be worn with the winter uniform during Term 2 and Term 3.
- Black soft shell jacket with crest; or any plain black jacket of their choice for warmth.
- Dark Royal, V-necked, long sleeved jersey with school crest
- · Dark Royal, V-necked, vest with school crest
- A non-hooded plain navy blue polar fleece jacket may be worn.
- PE uniform Opihi College Rugby/Polo shirt with black shorts (mid-thigh maximum length and no cycle type shorts). A change of socks are to be worn with gym shoes. On cold days a black track suit or a plain coloured sweat shirt in your house colour and track pants may be worn. A white sweatshirt is also acceptable. (The P.E. Rugby / Polo shirts are available to order and purchase through the school office cost \$60.00.)







PERSONAL PRESENTATION - SCHOOL REGULATIONS

These regulations apply to all students. The appearance of the students is expected to reflect credit on the school at all times.

- Hair must be clean, tidy and tied up if longer than shoulder length. No extremes including changing hair to unnatural colours. Boys must be clean-shaven. Hair ties must be in school colours. (Blue, black and white.)
- A Taonga or other item of religious or cultural significance may be worn appropriately. It is to be removed for health and saftey reasons as required.
- Students may only wear one <u>plain</u> silver or gold stud earring per ear at their own risk. No other jewellery should be visible. Facial piercing, nose studs, tongue piercing and visible tattoos are not permitted.
- For students in Years 7 13 the school uniform is to be worn correctly and neatly. Make-up and coloured
 nail polish are not to be worn with school uniform.

PLEASE NOTE: Winter Uniform is optional from the beginning of Term 2 but is compulsory after Queen's Birthday weekend. **Summer Uniform** is optional from September 1st but is compulsory after Labour Weekend.
