Climbing Mount Kilimanjaro for Charity

Mr Sharp will be off to Africa later this term to climb Mount Kilimanjaro to raise funds for the Mental Health Foundation. Mount Kilimanjaro is the highest peak in Africa at 5895 meters / 19,341 feet. There is a 20 strong Kiwi team making the trip which will take them through the jungle and across the three peak dormant volcano over about eight days of climbing. The Mental Health Foundation is the foremost charitable provider of mental health resources, training and advice in New Zealand and only survives through charitable donations. Mr Sharp is paying his own costs and so all funds will go to the charity. This week he travelled to Craighead where their health committee donated \$269.50.

Opihi College students will have the opportunity to make a contribution to the charity with a Mufti Day on Friday the 11th of August.

Mr Sharp will be talking about the trip in assembly on Monday. So far his team have earned over \$90,000 and are hoping to break the \$100,000 mark before they go. RUGBY - U16 and U18 players


